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general misunderstandings and the influence of epilepsy on children s lives were reported most authors reporting a knowledge deficit about epilepsy and others only acceptable knowledge that is most studies report negative attitudes toward epilepsy with few reasonably positive attitudes poor awareness about epilepsy and unfavorable attitude towards patients living with epilepsy are sources of stigma and discrimination and are predictors of poor quality of life and delay for modern treatment in people living with epilepsy regarding attitudes toward epileptic patients we observed a positive attitude in matters of having children and successfulness of those patients but not for marriage which showed a disappointing result about 44 6 refuse to be affianced to someone with epilepsy which was consistent with a systemic review done in africa but it was better abstract introduction epilepsy is a chronic neurological disorder
