the popularization of radio television and the internet radically transformed musical practice in the asia pacific these technologies bequeathed media broadcasters with a profound authority over the ways we engage with musical culture broadcasters use this power to promote distinct cultural traditions popularize new music and engage diverse audiences they also deploy mediated musics as a vehicle for disseminating ideologies educating the masses shaping national borders and promoting political alliances with original contributions by leading scholars in anthropology ethnomusicology sound studies and media and cultural studies the 12 essays this book investigate the processes of broadcasting musical culture in the asia pacific we shift our gaze to the mechanisms of cultural industries in eastern asia and the pacific islands to understand how oft invisible producers musicians and technologies facilitate frame reproduce and magnify the reach of local culture

when twenty three year old carrie prudence winter caught her first glimpse of honolulu from aboard the zealandia in october 1890 she had never seen anything so beautiful she had been traveling for two months since leaving her family home in connecticut and was at last only a few miles from her final destination kawaiaha o female seminary a flourishing boarding school for hawaiian girls as the daughter of staunch new england congregationalists winter had dreamed of being a missionary teacher as a child and reasoned that teaching for a few years among the sandwich islands seemed particularly attractive while her fiancé pursued a science degree during her three years at kawaiaha o winter wrote often and at length to her beloved charlie her lively and affectionate letters provide readers with not only an intimate look at nineteenth century courtship but many invaluable details about life in hawai i during the last years of the monarchy and a young woman s struggle to enter a career while adjusting to surroundings that were unlike anything she had ever experienced in generous excerpts from dozens of letters winter describes teaching and living with her pupils her relationships with fellow teachers and her encounters with hawaiian royalty in particular kawaiaha o enjoyed the patronage of queen lili uokalani whose adopted daughter was enrolled as a pupil and members of influential missionary families as well as ordinary citizens she discusses the serious health concerns leprosy smallpox malaria that irrevocably affected the lives of her students and took a keen if somewhat naive interest in relaying the political turmoil that ended in the annexation of the hawaiian islands by the u s in 1898 the book opens with a magazine article written by winter and published while she was still teaching at kawaiaha o which humorously recounts her journey from connecticut to hawai i and her arrival at the seminary the work is augmented by more than fifty photographs four autobiographical student

essays and an appendix identifying all of winter s students and others mentioned in the letters a foreword by education historian c kalani beyer provides a context for understanding the euro centric and assimilationist curriculum promoted by early schools for hawaiians like kawaiaha o female seminary and later the kamehameha schools and mid pacific institute

when war struck december 7 1941 the people of hawaii were not unprepared within minutes after bombs fell on pearl harbor a well rehearsed disaster relief plan went into full operation thousands of volunteers of all ages and races toiled selflessly to bring order out of chaos even before the pall of smoke had died away air raid trenches had begun to crisscross lawns by nightfall windows were blacked out curfew stilled the darkness and citizen soldiers stood girded for a last ditch fight during the following tension ridden days the entire populace was fingerprinted and inoculated gas masks were issued and evacuation kits prepared barbed wire entanglements taped windows sandbag barricades camouflaged buildings gas alarms everywhere were constant grim reminders of total war no other american community felt the tensions and shapeless fears the islands knew during those first months after pearl harbor and as the pacific war progressed no other american community felt its impact so much as hawaii headquarters area training staging and supply area repair base hawaii served as the springboard of the pacific offensive hordes of troops and war workers deluged the islands land and buildings were taken over by the armed forces controls of every type plagued businesses and individuals no phase of island living was left untouched by the war hawaii s war years 1941 1945 the official history of hawaii s dramatic part in world war ii is a comprehensive unbiased account based on material collected over a six year period by the hawaii war records depository written by an island newspaperwoman with the proper perspective for a subject of such scope the book does not attempt to render judgments it is primarily a book of record a straightforward presentation of facts
